

Reflection on the Gospel by Nibs Stroupe from Daily Feast: Meditations from Feasting on the Word

In these verses in Mark, Jesus indicates that the power of these categories must be recognized and confronted in our lives if we are to experience the gracious and stunning love of God. He uses the metaphor of tying up the strong man in order to plunder his property. In using this parable, he speaks of the need of the gospel to expose our captivity to the "strong men" of our lives. In so doing, he seeks to free up our imaginations, which have become the property of Satan. Our captivity to Satan must be exposed in order for us to begin to discover the glorious freedom of the children of God, as Paul puts it so powerfully in Romans 8:21. In what ways are you held captive by the powers of Satan?

A LITTE COMMENTARY ON 1 SAMUEL



In her sermon last week, Pastor Melinda focused on what was happening at the time Samuel was called. Israel was in disarray as was the Temple. Last week's reading recounted how Samuel was called by God when he was just a boy and didn't recognize God's voice. She noted that Samuel became a priest, a judge and a prophet and was the greatest religious figure since Moses to the Israelites. Well, this week, we see Samuel not as a boy but as an older man, well respected, trusted and well established. Apparently Samu-

el's leadership wasn't enough for the Israelites—they wanted a king, a king like everyone else had. This desire disturbed Samuel perhaps because Samuel recognized that he would lose power, a very human reaction to a proposed change. God essentially tells him "Nonsense! The people aren't rejecting YOU, they are rejecting ME." God instructs Samuel to make people aware of what it will mean for them to be subjects of a king. Maybe this is the first time we exclaim "Careful what you pray for!" God often wants more for us than we want for ourselves. We follow people or ideas that work against our own interests, simply because we want to be like everyone else. In our own day, what might we be longing for that keeps us from participating in the Kingdom of God?



In MALI, extreme weather and the skyrocketing cost of fertilizer have made it hard for the poorest to survive. Your love provides food and fertilizer kits to help families like Deba's grow nutritious crops like carrots, cowpeas and drought-resistant moringa.



In **SOUTH SUDAN**, many communities are nomadic. "Home" is wherever there is relative peace and grass for their cattle to graze. Your compassion follows these populations in mobile medical clinics, which are set up in tents that can be packed up and moved when violence or seasonal flooding forces the community to relocate.



In remote mountain villages in **PERU**, you equip farmers with knowledge and supplies to sustain themselves. They have learned to grow a wider variety of crops, and you have provided training and support for them to raise livestock. Children who were once sick and malnourished have grown into young adults who are pursuing education and opportunities to further their communities.



In **UKRAINE**, our mobile medical clinic serves people who stayed behind — many of whom are elderly or could not afford to evacuate. Located in the back of a tractor-trailer, the clinic carries doctors to the hardest-hit regions near the Russian border. The clinic stays about two weeks in each location to ensure your love reaches as many people as possible.

purchases grain and fertilizer to support 10 farming families in Mali. Due to the war in Ukraine and other contributing factors, the price of these key supplies has skyrocketed in the past two years — leaving more and more families hungry. The fertilizer helps to boost their crop production, and the grain provides nourishment until their harvest is ready. With your support, Lutheran World Relief identifies those with greatest need to ensure the most vulnerable are cared for.



provides a solar panel system for one mobile clinic in South Sudan. There is no electrical grid in remote areas and fuel for generators is scarce, so solar panels are necessary for lighting and refrigeration. Without them, women give birth by flashlight, and there is nowhere to preserve vaccines that need to be kept cold.



establishes 750 plots of staple foods like quinoa, oatmeal and beans in 10 communities suffering from food insecurity in Peru. Diversifying their crops has helped them to prevent malnutrition and to weather the challenges of their unique land and changing weather patterns.



provides two months of medical supplies for our mobile clinic in Ukraine. The clinic offers basic health services such as general medicine, cardiology, gynecology, ultrasound and psychotherapy. It also carries a supply of common prescriptions on board. The clinic sees an average of 72 patients a day, seven days a week, for a total of 4,320 patients in two months.


