ALL SAINTS & ALL SOULS DAY

November 1st and 2nd, 2024



All Saints Day is a major feast of the Church, right up there in importance with Christmas and Easter. Therefore, worship this weekend will be a little different. Both Saturday (5:15 pm) and Sunday (11:00 am) will celebrate the Eucharist with Eucharistic Prayer D. Prayer D traces its origin back to the Orthodox Syrian Church of the third century. It is also the most ecumenical of our six eucharistic prayer choic-

es. Since we are celebrating all the saints, this seems the most appropriate prayer to use. Within this prayer we will remember the saints who have died since last All Saints Day (this is incorporating All Souls Day into our service.) During worship, we will also remember and reaffirm our baptismal vows. Be prepared to be sprinkled.

At our Sunday Worship we will have a modest amount of incense, appealing to our sense of smell and a reminder of the Holy Spirit's presence among us. We will also have a special appearance of several saints from centuries gone by. Come and see our Sunday School Children dressed up a various saints. Canon Melinda will explain each saint represented in lieu of a sermon.

Dear beloved of the Episcopal Diocese of Bethlehem,

The Rt. Rev. Paul V. Marshall. died on Monday, October 21, 2024. He was born July 25, 1947, in New York City, NY.

A native of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, Bishop Marshall grew up in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod. He received his B.A. from Concordia College (Indiana) and his M. Div. from Concordia Seminary (Missouri). Ordained as a Lutheran pastor, he served for several years as a chaplain in the U.S. Army before becoming an Episcopalian.

He was ordained to the ministry of the Episcopal Church in 1978 in the Diocese of Fond du Lac and earned a doctorate from General Theological Seminary. While at General, he also taught homiletics, Latin, and liturgy. In 1982, he became rector of Christ Church in Babylon, New York, and began teaching liturgy and homiletics at the Diocese of Long Island's George Mercer School of Theology. He became an associate professor of liturgy at Yale Divinity School in 1989, a position he held until his consecration to the episcopate.

Bishop Marshall was elected as the 8th Bishop of Bethlehem on December 2, 1995, and was consecrated on June 29, 1996, at St. Stephen's Pro-Cathedral in Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania.

During his episcopal ministry, he helped develop a companion relationship with the Diocese of Kajo-Keji, South Sudan. In 2007, The New Hope capital campaign raised over \$4 million for the construction of elementary and secondary schools, a college and various diocesan structures in Kajo-Keji. Bishop Marshall made several pilgrimages to Kajo Keji. The Rt. Rev. Dr. Lule James Kenyi, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Kajo-Keji, also shared his condolences: "He was indeed a great friend to us here in Kajo-Keji, and all the people here in the Episcopal Diocese of Kajo-Keji and at Kajo-Keji Christian College wish to send their condolence and sympathy to both the Diocese and the family of Bishop Paul." Bishop Marshall retired on December 31, 2013.

I mourn Bishop Paul's passing and recall his ministry among us as bishop, theologian, teacher and advocate for the most vulnerable. Our prayers go out to his wife, Diana, his family, and all those who loved him.




