Unfortunately, the required course is no longer offered so the group cannot accept new members.

My Brother's Keeper AKA Ugly Quilts News

My Brother's Keeper has evolved over our 32 years and we are in the midst of change again.

We have been including clothing in each sleeping bag. Not only are we hearing that there is a problem with the homeless just leaving/ littering what doesn't fit, we are getting a lot of items that are not on our brochure list that takes a lot of time and space to sort, donate or dispose of. In just the past two weeks we have gotten shoes, woman's clothes like small sleeveless tops, nurses scrubs, children's items, size 3X shirts...etc. When dress shirt came in we used them, but we have been inundated! Even the tee shirts in sizes we do use are plentiful. We have so many we are out of storage space.

For these reasons, WE ARE NOT TAKING ANY CLOTHING EXCEPT MEN'S SWEATSHIRTS, SWEATERS, FLANNEL SHIRTS OR CHAMOIS SHIRTS. SIZES M, LG, XLG ONLY. NOTHING LARGER.

Yes we are still taking socks, scarves, hats, mittens and the non-clothing items listed in the brochure.

Items you would have given to us can be donated to:

Red Door Gift Shop 359 Broad St Waverly, NY. They will pass them onto the Open Door Mission thrift store in Owego, NY to support their homeless shelter and programs.

North Waverly Chapel Waverly, NY has two drop off areas. One behind the church , and in the parking lot shed.

Nichols NY Catholic Charities has moved so they don't have the storage they used to so call first.

Salvation Army food pantry Fulton St South Waverly, PA I believe has a drop box for clothing .I wasn't able to get ahold of them to confirm.

We have been partnering with Hearts for the Homeless. There are several large red metal collection bins in the Elmira area. We usually use the one at Notre Dame H S. Locations are on their website. Donations fund their pop up food pantries, soup kitchens and other homeless issues.

We have relied on the generosity of the community and are grateful for all of the support, but we really must make these changes.

Also, WE ARE HAVING AN OPEN HOUSE TUESDAY, DECEMBER 3RD DURING OUR REG-ULAR WORK TIME 9:30 - 12:00 AT THE METHODIST CHURCH 118 S. MAIN ST, ATH-ENS,PA. We are in need of volunteers and thought this would be a good way for people to see us in action, see how the sleeping bags and blankets are made. 
